## UN JOURNALISTE DANS NOTRE JARDIN

It was a pleasure to have journalist and avid gardener, Robin Powell visiting to see our camellias on Thursday the 24<sup>th</sup> of June. Following a discussion Robin had with Pam Watson our home garden was suggested as being worthy of a visit prior to the Annual Show to be held some 17 days later [Unfortunately Covid Cancelled the Show].

Robin has a number of camellias herself but her main interest was to see the culture of camellias that enables them to be kept down to small shrub size rather than growing into specimen trees (even though some of the original plantings in our garden are in that category). Carolyn's special interest in sports intrigued Robin and there were some of the *Aspasia Macarthur* group in bloom such as the parent, Lady Loch, Otahuhu Beauty and Margaret Davis; as well Helenor and Helenor Rubra were out together.

Carolyn then took us around the garden showing some of the miniatures that are currently flowering. Firstly it was two of weeping habit drifting over a dwarf sandstone wall; Marge Miller and Wirlinga Bride, then Tama-No-Ura, Maroon and Gold, Virginia Franco Rosea, Minato-No-Akebono, Baby Bear White, Black Opal, Unryu Tsubaki and Starry Eyes. Species were another selection that Carolyn has a special interest in cultivating. *Camellia yuhsienensis*, *rosiflora*, *grijsii*, *kissii*, *oleifera* and the extremely small *parvilimba* were out on the day. Robin was glad to have some of Pam's *crapnelliana* seed pods to take home for an experiment in propagation as they ripen and open up.

Carolyn's bright and deep reds were another class catching Robin's eye; Tomorrow, Susie Fortson, Red Crystal, Bob Hope and Royal Velvet. This naturally led to an investigation of the intriguing purple of Dona Herzilia De Freitas Magalhaes.

Overall, it was great to welcome someone with a desire to gain more knowledge: from the theoretical-- "Camellia Register" and its editor, Thomas Savage (of Wirlinga fame), to gaining practical hints on showing and growing camellias.





## PROPAGATION AND PRUNING UPDATES

Following Fran Hackett's donation of seeds earlier in the year we planted some in Jiffy Pots in propagation boxes and some in jars to see how they would germinate under different conditions. They did so at a similar rate. In both cases they produced both tap roots and shoots. We are now at the stage where the seedlings have been potted up into 100mm pots in a suitable potting mix. Initially they were under the shelter of cut off cool drink cups but as they have grown these have had to be removed.

One of our hedges was pruned back severely at the end of the summer (see earlier edition). Following the start of the arrival of new shoots, further pruning was deemed to be necessary to allow for the initial 300mm growth that would be desired to create a neat top surface to the hedge as it developed.

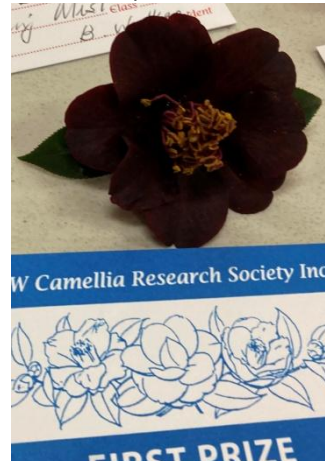

## ARE THOSE CAMELLIAS RED OR BLACK?

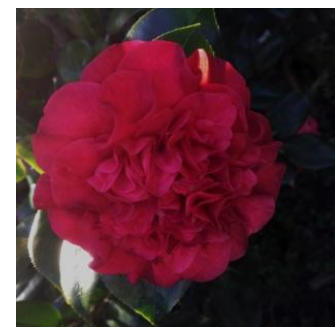
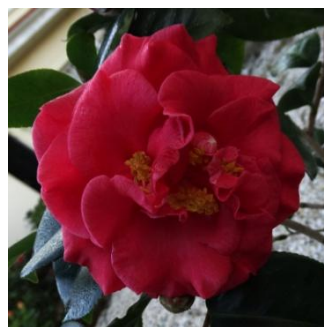
*Ruby Bells**Kuro Tsubaki**Night Rider**Black Opal*

I appreciate having the opportunity to talk about camellias, in particular about those raised by Os Blumhardt in NZ. He propagated 'Black Opal' and 'Night Rider' in 1985. Both have been in our garden from the earliest days after we moved in, in 1992. It was the colour of the blooms and the wonderful bronze/red new foliage which first caught my attention. I was used to formal double white or pink flowers but these were much smaller and almost black. It was not until I saw 'Kuro Tsubaki' in the Botanical Gardens of Nantes which was so different and so outstanding, that together with 'Ruby Bells' I could fully appreciate the lineage of these plants. When we were in Nantes accompanied by the Horticulturist and a pair of outstanding Camellians from the USA that I then became infatuated with the parent. The American fanciers were crazy about wanting to see 'George Washington' and I had to insist on being shown 'Kuro Tsubaki' first. They were not sure if I even knew who the famous George was. I said: "No!", even though I had taught American History.

Both 'Night Rider' and 'Black Opal' have the same genetic makeup, coming from crosses of the same parents: 'Ruby Bells' and 'Kuro Tsubaki'.

'Kuro Tsubaki' has been known in Japan since 1896. I believe that other people in NSW have examples of 'Kuro Tsubaki' but I have never seen it outside of France. Both it, and its progeny have unique physical features: those being; pink roots, mid-ribs and veins and dark red flowers.

The beauty of our longest-lived 'Black Opal' is its upright growth habit and it thrives in terms of flowering capacity because it is in 75% shade, only catching some direct sunlight for about one hour each morning. In the early days of our coming to Pymble I made a list of all the deep red camellias. I have secured many of them, however, a few did not survive in our soil with the use of chlorinated water.

Currently, many of our red ones are blooming and the cold weather is turning their reds at least two shades darker.

Most noticeable have been:

'Royal Velvet'-which we see every day through the kitchen window;

'Maroon and Gold'-its small bush a mass of deep red highlighted with its golden stamens, hiding under 'Red Crystal'





(another red special), was named for the University of Southern California which has Cardinal and Gold for its colours (as did Florida State University where our son studied at one time);

'Black Magic'-shares the same microclimate as 'Black Opal' and once again developed by the Nuccio Family;

'Bob Hope'-darker than usual but always a strong colour in our garden.

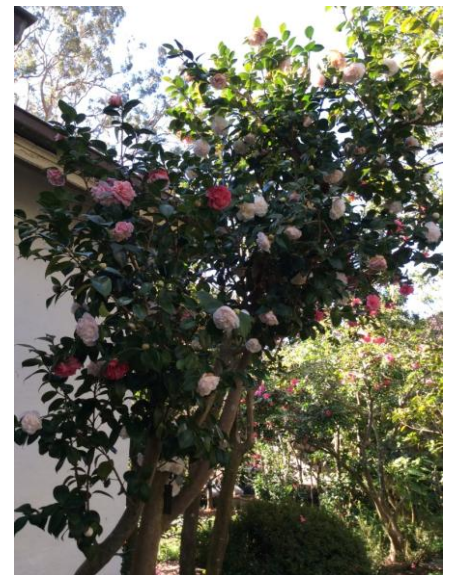
